NEWS FROM AROUND THE WORLD

Europe

Earlier in April, the European Commission issued a <u>communication</u> on reforming the Common European Asylum System. Having already initiated proposals on *inter alia* Dublin, Eurodac, and a European Border and Coast Guard, it is now aiming to launch detailed proposals on 7 July 2016 for a new recast Reception Conditions Directive as well for turning the Asylum Procedures Directive and the Qualification Directive into Regulations. More recently, the Commission also <u>released</u> a communication on a

reform of the Blue Card scheme and presented its Action Plan on Integration. A reform of the Return Directive, as well as an EU legislative instrument on resettlement are being contemplated.

The first inadmissibility decisions under the amended Greek Law have been

successfully appealed in the wake of the implementation of the EU-Turkey deal which uses the 'first country of asylum' and 'safe third country concepts to return Syrians back to Turkey. The quashing of the decisions comes at a bad time for the EU politicians as the EU-Turkey deal has already come under a lot of pressure.

On 22 June 2016 the Grand Chamber of the European Court of Human Rights in Strasbourg held a <u>hearing</u> in the case of *Khlaifia v. Italy* in which a Chamber previously found a violation of the prohibition of collective expulsion as well as a violation of Article 3 ECHR while the applicants – three Tunisians – were held in *Contrada Imbriacola*, an Early Reception and Aid Centre.

Asia-Pacific

On May 28, 68 Syrian refugees <u>arrived</u> in Kuala Lumpur out of 3000 Malaysia aims to receive, while Vietnam <u>jailed</u> <u>four</u> asylum seekers returned by Australia. Meanwhile, the migration and refugee theme is starting to <u>weigh in</u> on the Australian federal elections which will take place on 2 July 2016, with contender <u>Bill Shorten</u> of the Labor Party also seemingly in favor of offshore processing of asylum seekers and resettlement in countries other than Australia.

Americas

According to the Washington Times, on 23 May the US State Department has set <u>a new single-day record</u> for Syrian refugee approvals. Meanwhile, Donald Trump kept <u>railing against 'illegal migration'</u> during his campaign.

EVENTS AND CALL FOR PAPERS

Conferences

The first annual conference of the Refugee Law Initiative on <u>"The Future of Refugee Law"</u> will take place between 29 June and 1 July 2016 in London.

The <u>#StatelessKids Youth Congress 2016</u> organized by the European Network on Statelessness will take place from 11 to 13 July 2016 in Brussels.

The 16th edition of the <u>Summer School on EU Immigration and Asylum Law Policy</u> organized by the Odysseus Network will take place between 4 and 15 July 2016 in Brussels.

Call for papers

The 11th Annual Centre for Refugee Studies Student Caucus Conference will be held from 23-24 September 2016, <u>focussing on</u> the production of forced migration. Deadline for abstracts (250 words) is 30 June 2016.

The Centre for Southeast European Studies at the University of Graz, Austria is organizing a conference titled "<u>Unsettled Europe</u>: Refugees, states and politics in Southeastern Europe" and will take place in Graz from 27-29 January 2017. Abstracts (max. 300 words) are to be submitted by 20 September 2016.

The Nordic Journal of Migration Research has launched a <u>call for proposals</u> for special issues for 2018. Deadline is 15 July 2016.

From 6-10 April 2017, the University of Birmingham is organizing a conference on <u>'Heritages of Migration'</u> in Buenos Aires, Argentina, encouraging a provocative dialogue across disciplines. Abstracts (300 words) are to be submitted no later than 14 October 2016.

Other events

Within the Council of Europe, a <u>Committee of experts on Administrative detention of migrants</u> (CJ-DAM) had its first meeting between 23 and 25 May 2016 in Strasbourg. The CJ-DAM, working under the authority of the European Committee on Legal Cooperation, is instructed to codify existing international standards relating to the conditions in which migrants are to be held in closed administrative centres and, as appropriate, in other places of non-penal detention in the form of a recommendation for the Committee of Ministers. Further meetings are envisaged until the end of 2017, when the codifying instrument (recommendations) will be adopted by the Committee of Ministers.

The European Law Institute (ELI) recently started running <u>a project</u> on the "detention of asylum seekers and irregular migrants and the rule of law". The project aims to contribute to developing a harmonised approach to application of the common standards and effective implementation of the rule of law in detention cases of asylum seekers and third country nationals.

The REDIAL project which stands for the 'Return Directive Dialogue' has <u>produced its</u> <u>first outcomes</u>. The project is coordinated by the EUI's Migration Policy Centre and is funded by the European Commission. Its main purpose is to enhance the effective implementation of the Return Directive (2008/115/EC) through judicial cooperation among courts from all EU Member States.

The Interest Group on Migration and Refugee Law (MigRefLaw) is one of the interest groups of the European Society of International Law. The IG focuses on the law and policy of states and international organisations with regard to people who seek entry to their communities. The movement of people across borders is a defining reality of our time. This IG aims to provide a forum for discussion on the the legal principles and processes governing the movement of people as well as their reception in host communities. By doing so, the group hopes to build a shared knowledge base among ESIL members interested in migration and refugee law.
